STAFF SIGNS STATEMENT OF BELIEF

At a meeting in President Rudd's apartment on Friday, October 15th, the members of the staff signed the University Statement of Belief. In accordance with the University By-Laws, this is done annually. The Statement of Belief, as given in the Charter of the Bryan University, reads as follows:

1. We believe that the Holy Bible, composed of the Old and New Testaments, is of final and supreme authority in faith and life, and, being inspired by God, is inerrant in the original writings.

2. We believe in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost, this trinity being one God, eternally existing in three persons.

3. We believe in the virgin birth of Jesus Christ; that He was born of the Virgin Mary and begotten of the Holy Spirit.

4. We believe that the origin of man was by fiat of God in the act of creation as related in the Book of Genesis; that he was created in the image of God; that he sinned and thereby incurred physical and spiritual death.

5. We believe that all human beings are born with a sinful nature, and are in need of a Saviour for their reconciliation to God.

6. We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ is the only Saviour, that He was crucified for our sins, according to the Scriptures, as a voluntary representative and substitutionary sacrifice, and that all that believe in Him and confess him before men are justified on the ground of His shed blood.

7. We believe in the resurrection of the crucified body of Jesus, in His ascension into Heaven, and in "that blessed hope," the personal return to this earth of Jesus Christ where He shall reign forever.

8. We believe in the bodily resurrection of all persons, judgment to come, the everlasting blessedness of the saved, and the everlasting punishment of the lost.

BIBLE CONFERENCE BLESSINGS

A "spiritual feast," that is the one phrase that can be used to describe this year's Bible Conference. The Lord blessed throughout the conference and although all the students enrolled this year are saved, many accepted the challenge presented to them and gave their lives for full time service.

Pastor John Hay coming to us from St. Louis brought a series of missionary messages from Paul's Letter to Titus. He approached it as being a letter from a senior missionary to the younger missionary in charge of the station. Throughout the study Pastor Hay presented the practical side of the missionary work. Then Pastor Paul Zimmerman from Allegan, Michigan, brought a series of studies in practical Christian work centering around Worship Work, and Witnessing. His last message was on the Second Coming of the Lord. Rev. H. C. Geiger of Livingston, Tenn., came to us for two meetings and continued in the same line of thought. Closing the meetings on Sunday Rev. Herman Hoyt of Grace Seminary, Winona Lake, Ind., brought a challenging message in the afternoon and then closed the conference with another message on the Coming of Christ. Throughout each meeting the presence of the Lord could be felt. Other messages were delivered by Dr. Harris Gregg, Rev. Albert J. Levensgood, and Rev. John S. Brownlee, all members of the University Bible department.

Many students accepted the challenge presented to them during the conference and gave their lives to the Lord Jesus for service. A real refreshing time during the conference was the "Song and Testimony" meetings that took place in the University Chapel after the evening services downtown were over. In these meetings many testified of the blessings that had been theirs and others made public dedication of their lives to Him.—G. W.

WHY A STATEMENT OF BELIEF?

Elsewhere in this issue of the *NEWSETTE* is given a copy of the Statement of Belief as found in the Charter of the William Jennings Bryan University. The Charter provides that no one shall be placed in a position of leadership or authority either as a Trustee, Officer, or member of the faculty who does not subscribe with us to the Statement of Belief. The By-Laws provide that all Officers of instruction be appointed annually and required annually to sign the University's Statement of Belief. If any position assumed by any member of the Faculty meets with the disapproval of the President, his association with the University may be dissolved immediately, upon the payment of six weeks' salary. These provisions in the Charter and the By-Laws are intended to keep the institution true to the faith. They protect the rights of the people who founded the William Jennings Bryan University and those who have supported it through the years.


