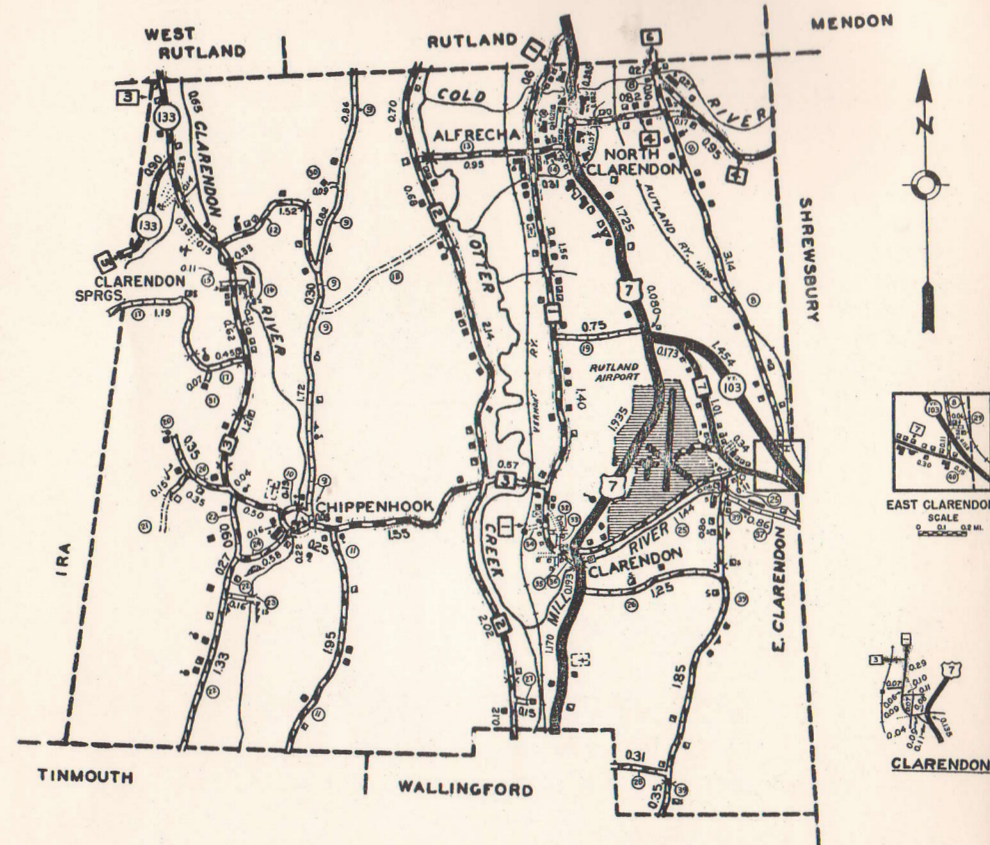

 the ensuing year for current expenses of the General

- Article 16. Mutual Aid—voted Town Fire Association may
 enter into Mutual Aid Agreements with other Town
 Fire Departments.
- Article 17. Otter Creek Grange—voted a tax exemption on
 property of Otter Creek Grange. Yes 136—No 115.

- Article 18. Other Business—Under Article 14—Question of
 meaning and correctness of Section 3 Article 5 of
 Zoning Ordinance as drawn up, making said Section
 to read "of two years shall **not** be thereafter re-
 sumed."

Amherst Weeks who has been Moderator for fifty
 years was presented with a plaque by the Town honor-
 ing him for long service to the Town.

The Moderator was asked by the Legislative Council
 of the State to read an Article concerning Secret Ballots
 at primary elections and secure the opinion of those
 present at Town Meeting on same. The Towns people
 voted by acclamation for Secret Ballots at State
 Primaries.

George Holden explained new set up on State Welfare.
 George Ridlon, Town Representative, gave a short
 talk about the tax set up as proposed in Montpelier—
 How much money will be needed and how such money
 may be raised—possibilities are Sales Tax or Income
 Tax.

The evening meeting was recessed until the following
 day when voting by Australian Ballot was done.

All business completed the meeting was adjourned at
 7:00 P.M.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The first meeting of the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Clarendon was held March 14, 1969.

Voted to borrow of Proctor Trust Company for payment of current expenses \$40,000 at 2 3/4% interest.

Joseph Raiche, Jr. was appointed Chairman of the Board and Mary Pratt, Clerk.

The following officers were appointed for the ensuing year:
Fence Viewers—Richard Pratt, Henry Potter and Russell Powers.

Pound Keeper—Norman Bowen

Weigher of Coal—John Pratt

Inspector of wood, shingles, etc.—Howard Pierce

Health Officer and Fire Warden—recommended by Selectmen and appointed by State—Alan Burr and Bernard Gregory.

George Holden was appointed by the Selectmen to act with the State Department of Social Welfare as Town Service Officer for one year.

A petition of Interim Zoning was received in January and the same was put into effect in September 1969. A public meeting for discussion of Interim Zoning was held and most of those present seemed in favor of same.

A Zoning Committee was appointed and Robert Stinson was named Administrator.

In June the Selectmen purchased a new loader for the Town. This had been needed for some time.

Taxes in the amount of \$379.35 were abated by the Board of Civil Authority in December.

Town Roads were inspected by Selectmen, Road Commissioner and District Road Commissioner. It was decided to raise the Road beds on Alfreacha and Flats cross roads. It is hoped to prevent so much road flooding in this way.

The new school at North Clarendon is well started and it is hoped it will be opened in September 1970.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DIRECTORS AND SUPERINTENDENT

The new elementary school is under construction and, at the present writing, is approximately one-third completed. It is expected that the building will be finished in August.

The bonds for the school have not yet sold because of the condition of the money market. It is expected that temporary borrowing will begin in February. We are waiting for two bills to be passed by the legislature that will help the situation. One is the establishment of a bond bank by the State and the other is the lifting of the maximum limit of interest.

We are including in the warning an article concerning the kindergarten. Voters must approve the establishment of a kindergarten by a school system.

Enrollment in our schools increased by 22% this year. This resulted in a severe strain on our present facilities. It is fortunate that we have taken steps to relieve our present buildings.

While we were able to reduce the school tax for the present year, we find that for the coming school year beginning in July, we shall have to request a large increase in the school tax. Let us consider the reasons for this.

1. During the next school year, we shall have to make the first year's payment on the new building. This is estimated at \$52,768.00.

2. We will need to increase our staff by three persons. Two elementary teachers and a librarian will be needed. This will increase our budget for salaries by approximately \$18,000.

3. We will need a full-time custodian for the new building. We have added \$6,300 to our budget for janitorial work by this person and part-time help.

4. By increasing our staff, our share of the Supervisory Union costs increase.

The total budget approved for the next school year is \$277,168.00. The debt on the new building and the remaining debt on the North School will need \$1.31 of our school tax. Tuition at Rutland and West Rutland will be \$1,100 and \$1,050 per pupil respectively for our high school pupils. This requires an increase of \$19,000 for that budget item alone.

We are recommending a school tax for the next school year as follows:

Operating expenses \$4.03

Debt:

New Building \$1.25

North School \$.06

The increase in tax money equals \$75,000. From our balance on July 1, we have \$20,000 for equipment and \$10,000 to apply on the debt.

CLARENDON FIRE ASSOCIATION

The Clarendon Fire Association's fiscal year runs from October 1 through September 30, therefore, this article refers to items for the period October 1, 1968 through September 30, 1969.

The Vermont State Firefighters' Association's annual convention was held in Bennington. In all events, we found the competition to be much stronger than in past years. The one trophy the firemen proudly brought home was "The Best Appearing Marching Unit with apparatus" (In State). This was the first year we were able to compete in this event, as the firemen, from their own finances, had purchased uniforms to make them eligible to compete for this trophy. This is a trophy for which all townspeople should be proud of, as our men were competing against fire departments from all sections of Vermont. Some of these departments were much larger than ours.

The Board of Trustees approved a request from the Clarendon School Board to use the Firehouse meeting room for classroom space until the new school is completed. The school board made necessary alterations to lighting, heating, fire escape and an access door to the upstairs. In addition, firemen painted the floor and are continuing paneling the downstairs section of the Firehouse.

Approximately 10 Fire courses were completed by firemen at Norwich University in August.

The trucks at the North Clarendon Station are 22 and 23 years old. Henceforth, a truck fund has been established to get money saved for an eventual new one. In doing it this way, we are receiving interest on the money as it is being saved. When the time comes to purchase a new truck, it will not be necessary to borrow the full cost of a truck, therefore, saving on loan interest costs.

Since last year, several lengths of new hose have been purchased, giving us some hose to reload with immediately after use while wet hose is drying. We still need a few more lengths for a satisfactory reload supply.

The Department answered 12 alarms during the past year.

This year we are again asking for \$2,000.00 as a donation from the town.

We sincerely hope you will find us worthy of this amount and support us on Town Meeting Day.

REPORT ON REGIONAL PLANNING

The Rutland Regional Planning Commission was created in March of 1967 and is now composed of 20 communities within Rutland County. There are 13 other similar bodies in the state. Basic reasons for formation were; to assist members in utilizing the Region's advantages and to encourage co-operation among themselves where it can be proven beneficial; to formulate a strong voice when speaking to state or federal governments; to secure technical help on planning related matters; to be eligible for certain grants; and to prepare studies and advisory plans for the orderly growth of the Region.

Representation is by one appointed Regular and/or Alternate Commissioner from each community regardless of physical size, wealth or population. The Town of Clarendon is represented by _____ as Regular Commissioner and _____ as Alternate. Open meetings are held once a month to discuss business and also work performed by the staff or consultant. These meetings have been rotated to different communities to emphasize the areawide philosophy of regional planning and to encourage individual participation.

The Commission embarked upon a two-year comprehensive planning project in July 1968 financed by a one-sixth assessment from members, a one-sixth grant from the State of Vermont and a two-thirds grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development's planning assistance program. In other words, a dollar of local money became six for planning purposes.

Completed to date are numerous maps of local interest, preliminary reports or discussions on economic base, population, housing, recreation, open space, finances, transportation, community facilities, model zoning and subdivision bylaws, a sketch plan, etc. In addition to these useful technical studies, the Commission has sponsored meetings of common interest, has aided individual communities in preparing plans, has helped in the adoption of interim zoning which gives temporary protection, has helped communities receive federal grants, has secured temporary waivers from the state sanitary landfill requirements, has set up an office retained a staff and consultant, etc.

The RRPC will become even more important in the future as communities face the pressures of increased growth and need for services. An agency such as the RRPC, composed of *local* representatives can look to the future and help develop proper approaches to cope with change. Through coordinated and cooperative efforts, plus technical aid, local governments may be able to accelerate endeavors to control their destiny before it is done by higher levels of government.

The two-year planning project is scheduled for completion by June 30, 1970. Early in its deliberation, the RRPC members agreed, that to be effective, its function must be a continuing one. The present two-year compre-

hensive planning project will be useful only if it results in action. They also recognize that grants are being predicated more and more on the basis of areawide planning participation. In fact, the prerequisites which now apply only to a few programs will eventually apply to dozens.

In order to continue the work of the Commission beyond June 30, 1970, additional local funds will be needed to match other sources. The town should vote to continue membership as well as an appropriation. A vote for regional planning will mean that communities will continue to be eligible for a variety of federal grants, that the two-year planning project of inventory-analysis-plans will not be forfeited and that help will be available to implement appropriate plans and ideas.

REPORT TO THE TOWN OF CLARENDON:

Last year this department initiated reporting to each town and city the amounts spent and people aided in each locality under the various programs of the Vermont Department of Social Welfare. This report replaced the previous annual notification to each town of the charges that had been assessed against their community for their share of State operated welfare programs. The enactment by the General Assembly of the Social Welfare Act of 1967 eliminated sharing in State welfare costs at the local level and consequently, the basis for this type of reporting to the towns.

This years report on amounts of money paid to money payment recipients in your town and monthly average number of recipients is for calendar year 1969 in contrast to the half year report made last year. In addition, we are able to report a full year of money spent for General Assistance and for the last six months of the year, the value of the bonus food stamps given to residents of your town and the monthly average number

of participants. General Assistance is the program that was formerly operated by your Overseer of the Poor. Your town's tabulation is as follows:

The above figures do not include money payment recipients residing in nursing homes or mental hospitals as there does not appear to be a fair way of assigning a town of residence to these people.

In addition, medical vendor payments for the calendar year 1969 totaled over \$11,000,000.00 (more than 1/3 of all department expenditures) and payments in behalf of committed children totaled over \$1,000,000.00 for a monthly average of 1480 children. No doubt, residents of your community were numbered among those who benefited by these expenditures.

RUTLAND COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT

January 1, 1969 - December 31, 1969

The end of December is a good time to stop and look at what has been going on in the past year and to plan for the new season. The Rutland County Mental Health Service has made some major changes in the past year. Staff has increased from 12 to 31. Programs have expanded and new services were added. Plans are underway to move to larger quarters in a few months. From an out-patient, consultation agency, it has developed into a comprehensive community mental health center. In January, 1969, one nurse was employed, today there are 11. Federal funding has greatly facilitated this growth.

The new services added are in-patient psychiatric hospitalization, offered in conjunction with the Rutland Hospital; emergency, 24 hour crises service, (telephone number 775-1000); a partial hospitalization program located at the Qahal Coffee House in Rutland and Gregory's in North Clarendon; mental retardation pre-school training, located at St. Joseph The Provider College, and in Fair Haven and Danby.

At the same time, direct out-patient service showed a substantial increase. Marital and family counseling, psychological testing, group and individual psychotherapy were provided to 843 Rutland County families as compared to 667 last year; 6,000 individual interviews and 112 group sessions were conducted as compared to 5,585 and 71 respectively last year. The after-care service helped 120 returning Waterbury Hospital patients find jobs, homes and security in Rutland County. The Youth Activity program provided a wholesome recreational outlet to 150 (44 last year) children in need of individual attention. Big Brother-Big Sister program increased from 100 to 171 children seen on a regular weekly basis. School consultation expanded to cover Poultney, Proctor, West Rutland, Rutland Town this year. Psychiatric consultation to physicians jumped from 82 to 122 with the advent of Dr. James Todd to the staff in July.

1969 was a busy year and 1970 promises to be even busier. Although difficult to assess, it is estimated that the Rutland County Mental Health Service is meeting 50 to 60 percent of the mental health needs of the county, a very good percentage in reference to the rest of the county but still far short of the goal of serving the mental health needs of Rutland County.
