Motion made, seconded and carried by acclamation that the Report be accepted.

Article 3—Number of Road Commissioners.

Motion made, seconded and carried that the article be laid on the table.

Article 4—Town Officers.

Town Clerk. Mary H. Pratt elected by acclamation.

Treasurer. Mary H. Pratt elected by acclamation.

Selectman. Motion made, seconded and carried that the Clerk cast one ballot for Charles Ruane for Selectman for 3 years.

Road Commissioner. Motion made, seconded and carried that the Clerk cast one ballot for Carl Lanfear for Road Commissioner for 1 year.

Overseer of Poor. George U. Holden elected for one year by acclamation.

Lister. Motion made, seconded and carried by acclamation that Milton Squier be elected Lister for three years.

Auditor. Motion made, seconded and carried that Clerk cast one ballot for Willard Squier for Auditor for three years.

Constable. George U. Holden elected Constable for one year.

School Director. Motion made, seconded and carried that Clerk cast one ballot for Zeola Raiche for School Director for three years.

Grand Juror. Aldace Newton elected Grand Juror for one year.

Article 5—Town Highways.

Motion made, seconded and carried that 25c on the Grand List be appropriated for care of Town Roads.

Article 6-Resurfacing.

Motion made, seconded and carried that \$100.00 be appropriated for work on gravel roads.

Article 7—Retreatment.

Motion made, seconded and carried that \$5,000.00 be appropriated for retreatment of Black Top.

Article 8—Tuition.

Motion made, seconded and carried that Town pay minimum tuition required by State for High school tuition, \$400.00.

Article 9—Taxes paid to Town Treasurer.

Motion carried by acclamation to pay taxes to Town Treasurer.

Article 10-Malt and Vinous Beverages, sold in Town.

No-13. Yes-49. Motion carried.

Article 11—Spirituous Liquors, sold in Town.

No-17 Yes-44 Motion carried.

Article 12—Borrowing Money.

Motion carried by acclamation that Selectmen be authorized to borrow for Town Expenses.

Article 13-Alfrecha Bridge.

Motion made, seconded and carried that Town go on record for building new bridge on the Alfrecha Crossroads.

Article 14—White Pine Blister Rust.

Vote carried by acclamation to appropriate \$300.00 for control of Blister Rust.

Article 15-Loader.

Motion made that Selectmen be authorized to buy a four wheel loader or shovel. Matter to be put up for bids. Discussion. Motion amended and finally withdrawn. A final motion made, seconded and carried that the Selectmen be authorized to get facts and figures on both shovel and bucket loader and submit such facts to the Town voters at a special Town Meeting to be held as soon as possible. Limit to be paid \$12,000.00.

Article 16-State Auditors.

Motion made and carried that the Town shall not employ services of State Auditors.

Article 17—Town General Tax.

Motion made, seconded and carried for a Tax of \$3.00 to pay Current Expenses of the General Account.

Article 18—School Tax.

Motion made and seconded for a School Tax of \$5.15.

Motion made and seconded for a School Tax of \$5.55.

Motion carried by acclamation for a tax of \$5.55 for current School Expense.

Article 19—Other Business.

Motion made and seconded to raise the pay of the Road Commissioner to \$2.00 per hour, and of the Road Help to \$1.35 per hour. No decision by acclamation.

By ballot Yes—41 No—35. Motion carried.

Some discussion of Union High School in Wallingford. Also further discussion of dump for Town. No action taken on either question.

Mr. Rich, Health Officer, speaks of polio shots, quarantines, etc.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The first meeting of the Board of Selectmen for the Town of Clarendon was held on March 10, 1962.

Percy Teer was appointed chairman of the Board and the Town Clerk to act as Clerk of the Board.

The following officers were appointed to act for the ensuing year.

Fence Viewers: Richard Pratt, Henry Potter, Russell Powers.

Pound Keepers: Hiram Spafford and Isadore LaVictoire.

Weigher of Coal: John Pratt.

Inspector of Wood, Shingles, etc.: Howard Pierce.

Tree Warden: Harold Johnson, Jr.

Fire Warden: William Lind.

Mrs. Betty Lincoln who had been acting Civil Defense Chairman resigned. Resignation accepted and Mr. Ruane was to find someone willing to take her place. No one has been found as yet. Volunteers gratefully received.

A special Town Meeting was held on May 26, 1962 to decide if the Town should buy a new shovel and how to pay for same if the vote is for buying.

The Town voted not to buy the machinery suggested by the Selectmen.

It was also voted at this special meeting that a separate account be kept of money spent and earned by Town Equipment.

Walter Balch was hired to mow Town Cemeteries.

See separate account of Town Equipment and all road work.

The Selectmen rented a Loader for Town use until March 1963, the rent to be \$111.11 per month. If in March the voters decide to buy this loader for \$4,000, the amount paid for rent will be applied on the purchase price.

The Selectmen and Road Commissioner met with John Durkee, District Highway Commissioner and planned work on State Aid Roads for the summer. These plans included some construction and retreatment of Black Top Roads. No new Black Top this summer.

The cost of Current expenses for the Town Schools for the School Year, July 1, 1961—June 30, 1962 was \$2,009.44 more than the School Tax plus State Aid and other small receipts. In accordance with State Law on this matter 25c on the \$100.00 of the Grand List was added to each Tax Bill sent out the first of July.

The Selectmen have felt that a new shed is needed for storing salt. It was decided to try to find a piece of land large enough for a building for storing road salt and for a garage for Town machinery. Decided not to buy salt in quantity unless such land could be purchased and shed built. To date no land has been found available.

At the December meeting Carroll Rich was recommended to the State Board of Health for health Officer for the Town for the ensuing three years. His appointment has since been received.

The Selectmen have purchased a new sander for \$508.93 to be used on winter roads.

Miss Irene Lynch requested that a tree on the Town Right of Way endangering her house, be removed at Town Expense. There being no funds allowed in the Selectmen's budget for this work they asked that the matter be left until Town Meeting. Miss Lynch was willing and the matter will be decided at the coming Town Meeting.

The work of White Pine Blister Rust Control has been completed in the Town for the time.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Directors and Citizens of Clarendon:

I submit my tenth report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The Clarendon Schools opened on Wednesday, September 5, 1962, with an opening enrollment of 154 pupils. This is a decrease of five from a year ago. There was one change in the teachers and that was at the Flats School where Mrs. June Sherrer replaced Mrs. Sesow in the upper room.

During the school year ending June 30, 1962, high school tuition cost the School District 21,814.53 for 63 pupils. These pupils attended the following high schools:

Rutland High School	44
Wallingford High School	9
West Rutland High School	10

This item will continue to be a large item in our budget. The maximum amount the School is obligated to pay is \$400 and tuition costs at West Rutland and Rutland are already at that figure and beyond. This maximum may be raised to \$500 in the near future.

For the coming school year, it is estimated that tuition costs will be approximately \$26,600. This is an increase in this item of \$4,600.

The School District ended its financial year on June 30, 1962, with a deficit. This resulted primarily from the cost of the new well at the Springs School. In the current year ending June 30, 1963, it is possible that the same result may occur.

For the coming school year of 1963-1964, the School Directors and Superintendent estimate that an increase in the school tax of 75c must be voted in order to meet the requirements of the budget. This will make the school tax \$6.30 divided as follows:

VERMONT STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH ANNUAL TOWN REPORT, 1962

The following health services were available from State-Federal tax money and local voluntary contribution to protect the health of the people of Clarendon, along with the people of the other towns and cities of Vermont. A tabulation of the principal State Health Department services which the residents of your town used last year follows:

With the aim of keeping children well and helping handicapped children, well-child and school conferences were attended by 160 children. None received hospital diagnosis, 7 with orthopedic, cardiac, plastic or neurological conditions received services or appliances through clinics for handicapped children and 1 was given financial aid toward hospitalization costs.

In the effort to control communicable disease 8 persons received chest x-rays; 91 children received immunizations, including boosters, against diphtheria, whooping cough and/or tetanus. Polio immunizations, including boosters, were given 63 children and adults in clinics and conferences. The state laboratory performed tests on 17 water samples, 46 blood specimens and 6 other specimens. Vaccines, antitoxins and biologicals were distributed for protection against communicable diseases.

There were 22 sanitary inspections or consultations made at the town's food and lodging places and 9 concerning water supply, sewage disposal, public buildings and other problems, to protect health through improved town sanitation. In connection with the state licensing program and the Hill-Burton federal aid program for hospital and medical facility construction there was 1 inspection-consultation to hospitals, nursing homes and homes for the aged.

Individual interviews with the psychiatrist, psychologist or psychiatric social worker was given 1.

In cancer work 2 received diagnosis and treatment at tumor clinics or was financially helped with hospitalization costs.

All programs in the department offer educational services. Pamphlets, films, a news release and information service and speakers are available.

The public health nurse served at well-child and school conferences, x-ray and immunization clinics, assisted by local people.

She visited homes, doctors, and agencies, making 279 visits on behalf of 96 persons and community health activities. Her service is an essential element in the department's program for health promotion, disease prevention, diagnosis, treatment and education.
