## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the Honorable Board of School Directors:*

I am pleased to submit my first annual report of the schools in the town of Clarendon.

Seven schools have been maintained during the present school year.

Statistics relative to teachers and pupils are as follows:

Mrs. Beulah Hayes, teacher, Clarendon Springs school, qualification certificate, State rebate per week \$3.00  
 Miss Ellen Leonard, teacher, Chippenhook school qualification certificate, State rebate per week \$3.00  
 Miss Edith Spaulding, teacher, Clarendon F. school, qualification certificate, State rebate per week \$3.00  
 Miss Doris Ross, teacher, East Clarendon school, qualification certificate, State rebate per week \$3.00.  
 Miss Madaline Tiernan, teacher, East Street school, qualification certificate, State rebate per week \$4.00.  
 Miss Mabel White, teacher, Hill school, probationary certificate, State rebate per week \$3.00  
 Mrs. Mabelle Powell, teacher, North Clarendon school, qualification certificate, State rebate per week \$3.00.

From the figures given above it will be noted that there will be a State rebate on account of trained teachers of \$22.00 per week.

In general the work of the schools has been of a very substantial character and the teachers deserve much credit for the results.

I find that some of the pupils of grade 8 are having some difficulty in doing the work, but it may be possible for most of them to complete the course during the ninth year.

Examinations have been made out by the superintendent for all pupils above the third grade and have been given during the month of January. The next set will come in the month of June. This will help to unify the work and will encourage the children to their best efforts.

It will also tend to give the teachers the information as to what is being done in the district and what is expected of the various grades. An outline of Vermont Geography has been furnished all of the teachers throughout the district and is intended to be taken up in grade 5 and sometimes in grade 4 if they can take the work together.

The Parent-Teacher Associations throughout the town of Clarendon deserve a great deal of credit for the good work they are doing, and also individuals for their special interest in the standardization of the different schools.

The schools at Clarendon Springs and Chippenhook are in splendid condition and there are two very efficient teachers in these schools.

The co-operation of teachers and parents will result for the welfare of all pupils attending these institutions.

The Clarendon Flats Parent-Teacher association is certainly doing excellent work and all encouragement possible should be given these people by the citizens and officers of the town.

It is economy for the town to have these groups of parents take such an interest in the renovation of the different school buildings.

All buildings used for school purposes should be kept in first class condition for the preservation of the property and a saving to the tax payers.

Books and supplies are always in demand for the schools and a reasonable amount should be furnished, if the best results are to be obtained. Some new books in reading have been very much appreciated by the teachers.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of the splendid co-operation of the citizens of the town, the excellent



spirit of the school directors in the best interests of all school problems, the industry of the teachers and the faithful work of the pupils during the present school year.
