# TOWN OF CLARENDON.

#### SCHOOL DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Board of School Directors met March 14, 1899, and organized by electing J. J. Brown, Chairman, and D. C. Hicks, Clerk, for the ensuing year.

At this meeting Geo. N. Randall was appointed Superintendent of schools.

Early in April demands were made upon the Board by Mrs. Barney Riley, Mrs. Frank Johnson, and J. D. Pratt for the transportation of their children to the Wallingford Graded School.

After a survey of the distance the several parties lived from the nearest school in Clarendon, the Board became satisfied that in the cases of Mrs. Riley and Mrs. Johnson they were justified under the provisions of number 23, of the Acts of 1898, in seeking some compensation from the town for the transportation of their children to and from the most convenient school.

Such arrangements as were entirely satisfactory to the parties interested were accordingly made, whereby the said children were carried to the Wallingford school.

Schools have been maintained in all the Districts in town but the Benson District, which was closed in the spring of 1898.

In addition, an extra school has been provided at Chippenhook for the fall and winter terms.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Believing that this matter of grading the schools is not sufficiently understood, I think it advisable to insert here a brief explanation of the ends to be obtained by the graded system and how they are to be reached.

The chief aim is to give the best training possible in the brief time many children remain in school.

By arranging a systematic course of study the pupil is enabled to begin at the beginning and progress steadily upward without any unnecessary delay caused by going over some of the work more than once or leaving out essential branches as is frequently done when the course of study depends on each successive teacher.

When teachers are changed there is no confusion and no time lost in classifying the pupils, for in every school there is kept a complete record of the names of the pupils and the grade in which each belongs. Then, too, a broader course of study is presented so that those who are unable to attend a higher school are better equipped to go out into the world.

The graded system also insures a better class of teachers and a better administration of school affairs, from the fact that it brings the Board of Directors in closer touch with the schools and teachers.

The patrons may at any time by consulting the manual ascertain whether or not the teachers are doing the prescribed work and keeping up with the grade.

Many people have complained to me that by following the grade work bright pupils are retarded. This complaint is the result of a misapprehension of the system.

No pupil is held back if he passes the examinations. Progress is as rapid as is consistent with thoroughness.

The course of study has been prepared by experienced teachers and it is rarely that the pupils can master the work *thoroughly* and go faster than the grade; but when such a pupil is found he is aided rather than retarded. In some cases during the present year pupils have been assisted in doing the work of two grades in one.

By grading schools time is saved by a steady upward progress, the pupil's energy is saved by avoiding all useless work, as his efforts are directed, only, along those lines which lead to a completion of the course, and money is saved by the doing of the work in the least possible time and by the readiness with which poor work on the part of the teacher may be detected.

I would earnestly recommend that all who help support the schools, give this matter careful attention, and see that they are getting the most good for their money.

It is a mistake to suppose that the schools can attain success without the hearty co-operation of the patrons.
